SECOND LESSON John 14:1–14 Barb

All: We reject policies that strip our communities of essential services, including gender affirming care, HIV, reproductive health, and other programs that serve people in need.

Rande: We are called to be people of conscience, holding elected officials to account to defend the Constitution, oppose self-dealing by public officials, resist policies that dismantle collaborative spaces and institutions, and uphold the inherent dignity of every human being. No exceptions. No compromises.

All: We rise-up against the forces that weaken democracy and erode our shared humanity.

Larry: We call the world to reimagine love as revolutionary, faith as liberating, and neighborliness as transformative; and let us honor the activism, resistance, and resilience that drive change.

TODAY'S GUEST PREACHER



Rev. Casey Tinnin is a queer pastor and justice advocate whose ministry centers on creating safe, inclusive spaces for LGBTQ+ youth and families. For seven years, he served as pastor of United Congregational Church in Loomis, CA, where he founded *The Landing Spot*, a secular support group for queer teens. His work has been featured in HuffPost and reflects a deep commitment to liberation, intergenerational community, and honest, vulnerable faith.

Casey holds two theology degrees, is a certified Enneagram teacher, and currently serves as Director of Community Outreach and Impact for SunSource and Grey Snow Sovereign Solutions. He lives in Northern California with his husband, Jose.

WORSHIP NOTES



Every June, we, along with millions of people and many other faith communities, observe Pride Month. Pride commemorates the 1969 riots at Stonewall Inn in Manhattan, widely considered one of the touchstones for the history of the LGBTQ rights movement.

As a church we believe that God loves all God's creation, including their rainbow-hued children—regardless of whom they love or how they understand or express their gender. As an expression of our faith, we affirm that every person is recognized and seen as valued. Pride Month is a time for us to "worship beneath God's all-inclusive rainbow" celebrating all our God-given identities and recommitting to the work of liberation for all LGBTIQ+ people.

Obstacles to living a full life for our young people also persists. Stigma, bullying, violence and harassment continue to threaten the lives of gay, lesbian, and bisexual youth. According to the Trevor Project, in the United States, the rate of suicide attempts is 4 times greater for lesbian, gay, and bisexual youth and two times greater for questioning youth than that of straight youth. And a 2024 study shows that anti-transgender laws cause up to a 72% increase in suicide attempts among transgender and nonbinary youth.

So for this month of June, let's continue to rise up as people of faith who believe in civil and human rights—and the *belovedness*—of all persons.

David Hayward (@nakedpastor) is a pastor turned artist painting, drawing, and thinking about what it takes to be free to be you. The idea behind the name, NakedPastor, is to seek to tell the naked truth—no matter how vulnerable it feels. The image on this week's bulletin, titled *Family Fun*, is about celebrating families that don't fit the cookie-cutter idea of a nuclear family. Real families love, accept and support one another — you could even say they pick each other up! Your family is what you make it!



Lili Ilse Elvenes, better known as **Lili Elbe**, was a successful Danish painter, transgender woman who, with the steadfast support of her wife Gerda, became one of the earliest recipients of gender-affirming surgery (then called sex reassignment surgery), undergoing five highly experimental surgeries in the 1930s. There are many gaps in the life story of Lili Elbe. There is speculation that Elbe may have been intersex or had Klinefelter Syndrome, but the destruction of medical and historical records leaves many questions unanswered. Nazi students destroyed books related to her story at German's Institute for Sexual Research in 1933, and in 1945, Allied bombing raids demolished the Dresden Women's Clinic which held

her medical documents.

Today's returning musical guest is DCC friend **Elana Bolds**, the visionary behind Visions of Hope Outreach in Richmond and creator of the Put the Guns Down movement. Elana, a promoter and singer-songwriter, is a Community Organizer and Event Planner for the cities of Richmond and Oakland. She has been recognized multiple times for her work over the past 29 years that has made a profound impact in the community.

The Lavender Interfaith Collective (LInC) is a vibrant and diverse community of LGBTIQ* and allied faith leaders, united across a rich tapestry of religious traditions and spiritual practices. In advance of the recent World Pride held in Washington, DC, the collective issued a <u>powerful call to action</u> on behalf of LGBTIQ people globally. This

call to action begins: Across faiths, identities, and nations, we are united by one unshakable truth: every person is worthy, every voice sacred, every body divine. Our unity is not rooted in a single tradition but in a collective belief in the sacred worth of every person. We uphold the fundamental principle of religious freedom, recognizing that no faith should dictate the governance of our nation. We reject all attempts to impose religious values, symbols, or authority upon our shared civic life, united in our commitment to a society where all traditions —and those who follow none—are equally respected. In the face of forces that seek to divide, erase, and harm, we unite as one—



rooted in justice, driven by love, and committed to a future where liberation is not just an ideal but a lived reality. The term LGBTIQ is used as a working shorthand for all the diverse experiences of sexual orientations, gender identities, gender expressions and sex characteristics which make up the myriad beautiful and complex diversity of humanity across languages, cultures and time.



Today, we sing four verses of Julian Rush's seven-verse *Ours the Journey*, a song (lyrics and tune) he wrote in the years immediately following his ouster from the church he was serving upon coming out as gay. The song, which can be viewed as a prayer, was first presented at the 1985 Rocky Mountain Annual Conference of The United Methodist Church at which the first Japanese-American United Methodist bishop was commissioned. This text celebrates diversity with the labels of gender, race, age, and sexual orientation named in the various stanzas; in some cases, we have adapted them slightly (substituting Indigenous for Indian) and have adapted the fifth verse to be more inclusive of various LGBTQ+ identities. The song is rarely presented in its full seven-verse form (only five verses are included in the UCC hymnal). We concur with the Discipleship Ministries of the United Methodist Church who wrote in 2018, "In

the Midst of New Dimensions is just as relevant today as it was at its creation, now thirty-three years ago. The first stanza begins 'In the midst of new dimensions, in the face of changing ways', which certainly describes the present world. The prayers of many Christians include the sentiments of Rush's text, and God still guides all of God's people." For a deeper look at this hymn, read this article from the Hymn Society in the United States and Canada. You can read more about Rev. Julian in this biography published by the LGBTQ Religious Archives Network.



The ONA Coalition of the United Church of Christ advocates for and supports lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, nonbinary, and queer individuals, equipping UCC congregations to fully embody Christ's extravagant affirmation. Through education, advocacy, and community-building, the Coalition empowers churches to become bold witnesses for LGBTQ+ justice and inclusion, ensuring that all people are celebrated as beloved children of God.

A statement from the <u>Open and Affirming Coalition</u> of the <u>United Church of Christ</u> in response to the Supreme Court Decision in U.S. v. Skrmetti

Today's decision by the U.S. Supreme Court to uphold Tennessee's ban on gender-affirming care for transgender youth is a moral failure and a heartbreaking injustice. This ruling abandons vulnerable children and their families to the political whims of state governments, disregarding the lived realities, medical consensus, and human dignity of transgender youth.

As people of faith committed to justice and radical inclusion, the Open and Affirming Coalition of the United Church of Christ grieves this ruling and the harm it inflicts. We reject the idea that any government has the right to deny life-saving, evidence-based healthcare because of a young person's gender identity. We reject a theology that would permit such cruelty. And we reject the misuse of power that seeks to control, erase, and endanger trans lives.



This decision is not just a legal setback—it is a spiritual wound. Trans and nonbinary youth are beloved children of God, created in the divine image, worthy of care, protection, and the fullness of life. Every attack on their rights is an attack on the sacredness of creation itself.

We are clear: Our trans and nonbinary siblings are not alone. We will not abandon you. The church, when it is truly living into the Gospel, must stand with the marginalized, defend the oppressed, and speak boldly against unjust laws.

We remain steadfast in our commitment to creating sanctuaries of love, safety, and affirmation—especially in states where this care is now banned.

This ruling does not end the fight. It intensifies our call to action.

Multiple opportunities to bless students in the coming academic year

Don't mention this to your kids or grandkids but it's time for our annual **Summer Backpack and School Supplies Drive** to provide new backpacks stuffed with school supplies for children of homeless, formerly-homeless and at-risk families now living in **Shelter, Inc.** and **Hope Solutions** housing.

Shelter, Inc. has provided us with the names of ten students for "adoption" by folks (individuals, families or groups) at DCC who are ready to shop for a new backpack for him or her and a complete set of grade-appropriate school supplies. Completed backpacks should be delivered to DCC by 11 AM Sunday, July 20th, and the Outreach Commission will take care of delivering them to Shelter, Inc.

If you want to "adopt" one of these Shelter, Inc. students, please contact <u>Doug Leich</u> or Eileen Ackley to select your student and they will provide you with Shelter, Inc.'s checklist of recommended items to include in the backpack.

Shelter, Inc. is also requesting **\$50** gift cards (Target or Kohl's) for uniforms or clothing and shoes, and you can sign up for these separately. Donations of any amount by check made out to DCC, with "backpacks" in the memo line will be used to purchase gift cards for Shelter, Inc. students. Shelter, Inc. also has an <u>online</u> sign-up to provide separate school supplies.

Hope Solutions also has an option for you to shop for a backpack and items on a checklist of school supplies.
